past (before now)

future (after now)

this morning last night yesterday 2 days ago last week

in two days
next week
next year




Simple Past Tense Verbs

Verb ends in a vowel sound or a voiced consonant (I, n, r, b, g, m, z, v), then the -ed ending sounds like a /d/

offered

used






Phonics
