cash register: a machine a shop uses to handle the sales and money (noun)





The store clerk took the money and put it in the cash register.



counter: a flat surface where you can put things, like food or drinks, so you can serve them to people (noun)





The bakery has a **counter** where you can buy bread and pastries.



display case: a glass box used to show things off, like food, toys, or jewelry. (noun)





The woman looked in the display case for something she wanted to buy.



receipt: a piece of paper that shows how much money you paid for something (noun)





The customer checked her receipt to see how much money she spent.
