Weather - Vocabulary



cold snap: a cold snap is many days of very, very cold weather (noun)



We had a **cold snap**, and it made everything freeze outside.

Weather - Vocabulary



freezing: temperatures cold enough to make things freeze and turn to ice (adj)



I wore a warm coat and hat to protect myself from the **freezing** weather.

Weather - Vocabulary



bundle up: to wear warm clothes to keep your body warm (phrasal verb)



Mom told me to **bundle up** in a coat, scarf, and boots before going outside.

Weather - Vocabulary



frostbite: skin that is red and painful from being too cold (noun)



We need to wear gloves and protect our skin from **frostbite** in the cold weather.

Cold Snap Safety



When winter arrives and it gets super cold outside, we need to stay safe and warm. **Freezing** weather can be tricky, but with some important steps, we can still have fun!

Cold Snap Safety



First, let's remember to **bundle up** and dress warmly. Wear a cozy hat, gloves, and a scarf. These are like special clothes that protect us from the icy cold. It's like becoming a winter superhero!

Cold Snap Safety



We should also know about **frostbite**. Frostbite happens when our skin gets too cold and can cause redness, pain, or numbness. If we think we have frostbite, we need to tell an adult and go somewhere warm right away.

Playing in the snow is fun, but we should take breaks and go inside to warm up. We can have hot cocoa and snuggle under a soft blanket. It's so cozy!

Cold Snap Safety



If it's really, really cold or there's a blizzard, it's best to stay indoors. During a **cold snap**, we can have fun inside by playing games, reading books, or watching movies with our family.

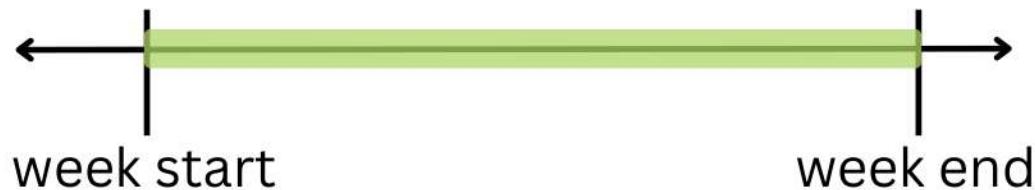

We use '**throughout**' for something that happens many times or all the time from the beginning to the end.

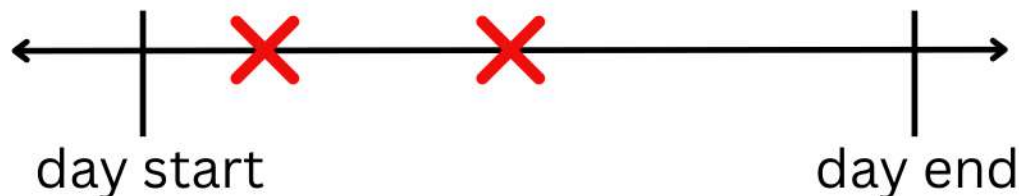
It rained **throughout** the whole week.
