


textbook: a book you use for school that teaches you about a subject (noun)






I carry my textbook in my backpack to school.



grade: a mark that a teacher gives you to show how well you are doing in school (noun)






My teacher gives me a grade after I finish my work.

Time-Traveling with Textbooks








"Hope he didn't get too shocked!"

Gerunds and Infinitives

A gerund is a verb + ing. This makes it a noun!

I like climbing.



An infinitive is to + verb. This can also act as a noun.

I like to climb.



We cannot use "to + swimming"



I like to climbing.





Gerunds and Infinitives

Some verbs can be followed by either a gerund or an infinitive.

begin, continue, start, hate, like, love, prefer

If we use two or more, then we should use the same type.

I prefer reading and sleeping.





We usually do not mix them.



I prefer to read and sleeping.
