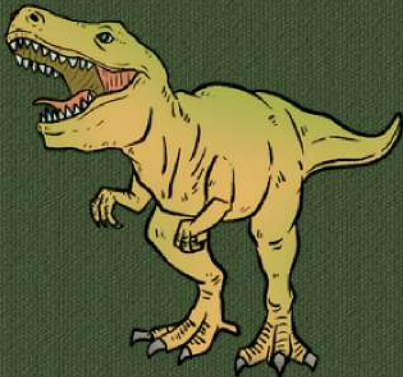

# Dinosaur - Vocabulary

Super  
English

**jaw:** the lower part of your face that moves when you open your mouth (noun)



She can open her **jaw** really wide to sing loudly.

# Dinosaur - Vocabulary



**tear off:** to remove something quickly and forcefully  
(phrasal verb)



The kids **tear off** the wrapping paper on Christmas morning.



# Dinosaur - Vocabulary



**agile:** able to move quickly and easily in all directions  
(adjective)



Cats are very **agile** and can jump high.

# Dinosaur - Vocabulary



**chomp:** to chew or bite on something loudly or with a lot of force (verb)



You can hear the hippo **chomp** on its food.

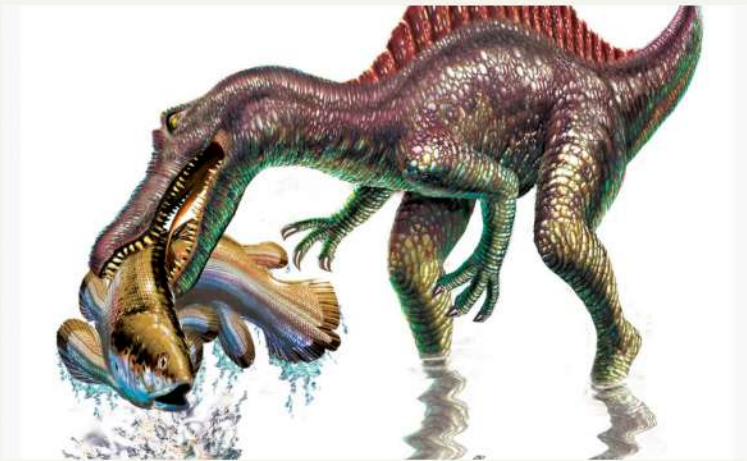
## Fun Fact:

Spinosaurus's sail might have been used to show off to other dinosaurs.



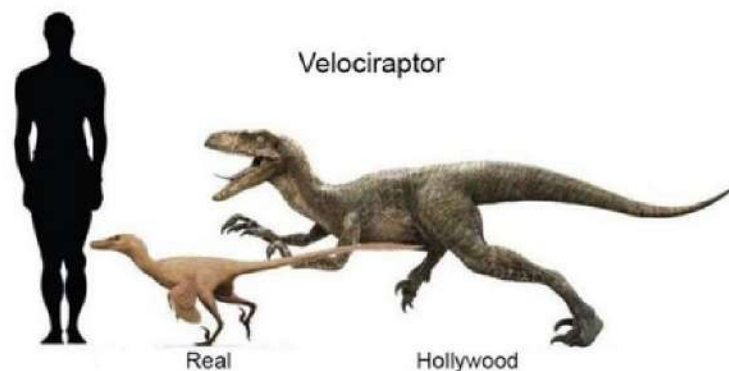
# Amazing Meat-Eating Dinosaurs!

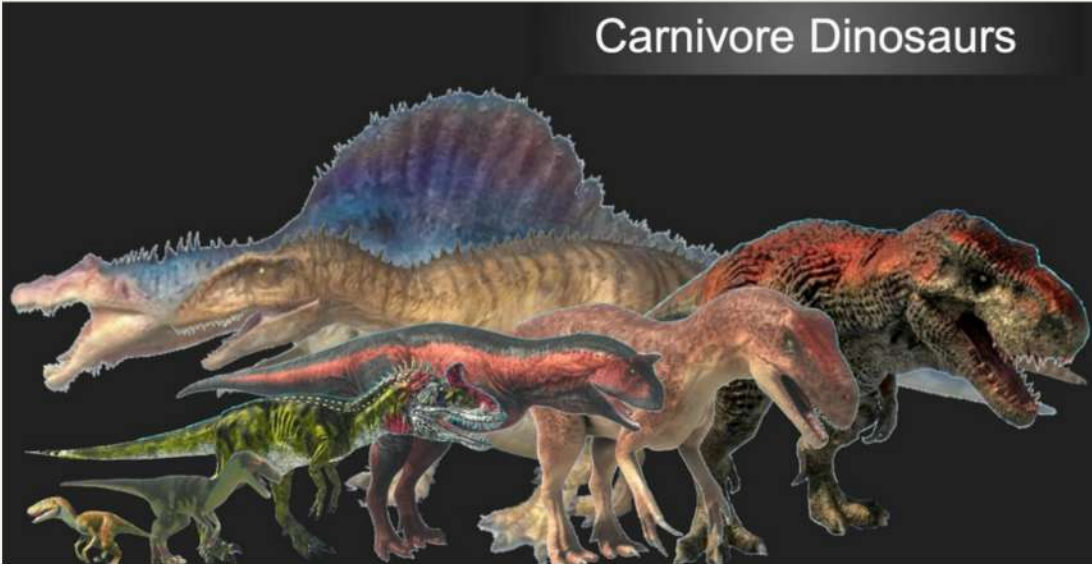
## Fun Fact:

It is important to learn how to use proper verb tenses.

Present Simple: Used for regular actions or facts.

I **sometimes go** to the beach. (**regular action**)

Sharks **live** in the ocean. (**fact**)

Present Continuous: Used for actions happening now.

I **am busy cleaning** my house **at the moment**.

I **am taking** swimming lessons **this month**.

Past Simple: Used for actions that happened in the past.

I **studied** for 2 hours **last night**.
