

gentle: kind and careful not to hurt or upset anyone or anything (adjective)






She was very **gentle** when holding the kitten.


Who Was the Tallest?

of the trees.


Fun Fact:


The Brachiosaurus had to eat hundreds of pounds of plants every day to survive and weighed as much as 99,000 pounds (45,000 kg) when fully grown.


Who was the toughest?
