gentle: kind and careful not to hurt or upset anyone or anything (adjective)

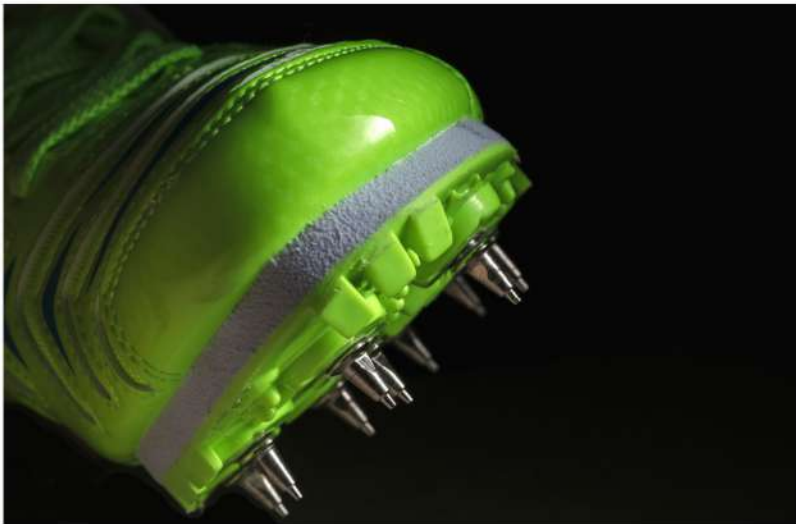


She was very **gentle** when holding the kitten.

spike: a thin object with a sharp point, especially a pointed piece of metal, wood, etc. (noun)

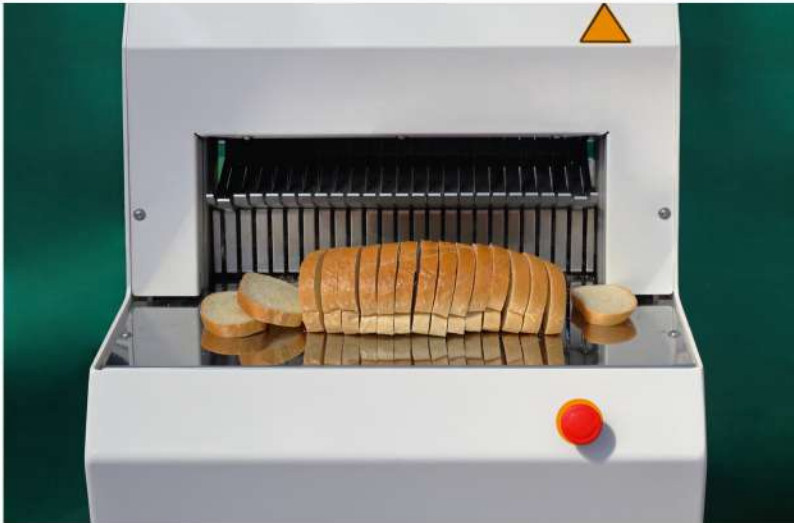


The runner has **spikes** on the bottom of his shoes to help him run faster.

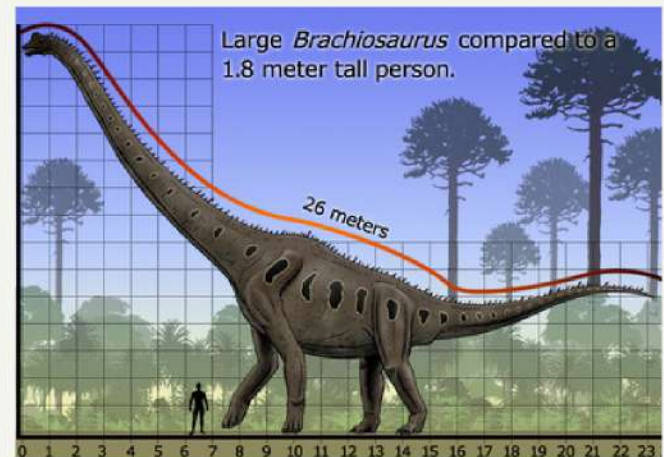

Who Was the Tallest?

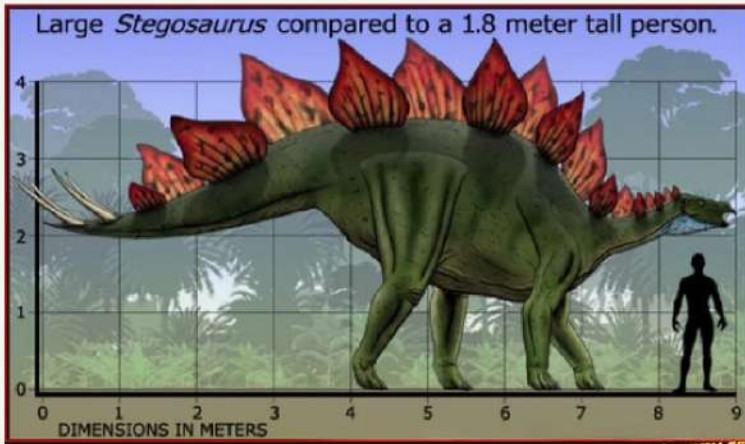

The *Stegosaurus* was huge, but its brain was only as big as a walnut.

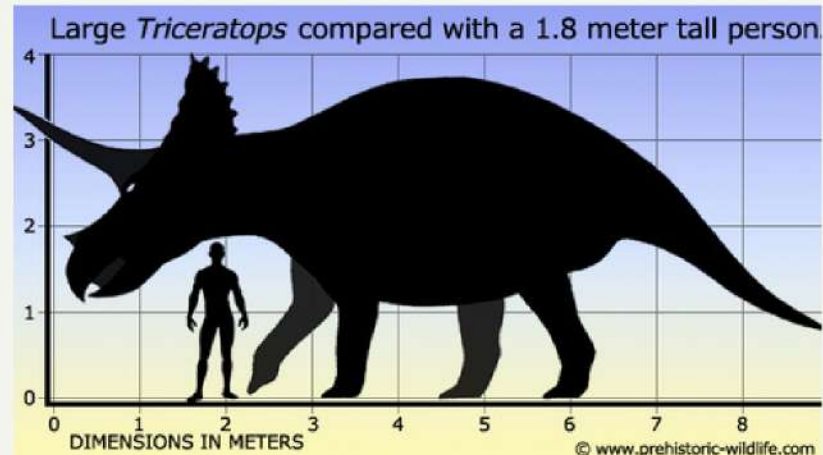
The Amazing World of Plant-Eating Dinosaurs!
