



original: being the first or earliest, or something unique (adjective)



Quetzalcoatlus was so huge, it stood as tall as a giraffe!

Our First Feathered Friend

Archaeopteryx (ar-kee-OP-ter-iks) is super cool because it's like the first bird ever! It had feathers and wings, but also sharp teeth and a long tail, a perfect **blend** of bird and dinosaur. Some people call it the "first bird" or "Urvogel," which means "original bird" in German.

Fun Fact:

Archaeopteryx's fossils show feathers like modern birds, but it couldn't sing.




