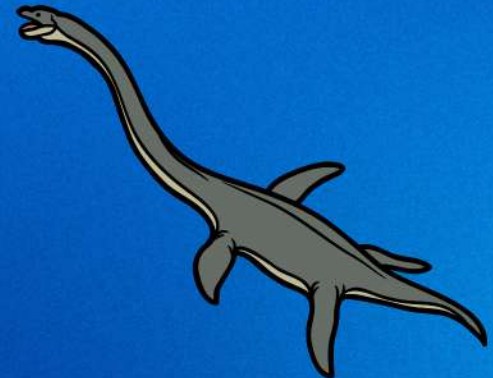


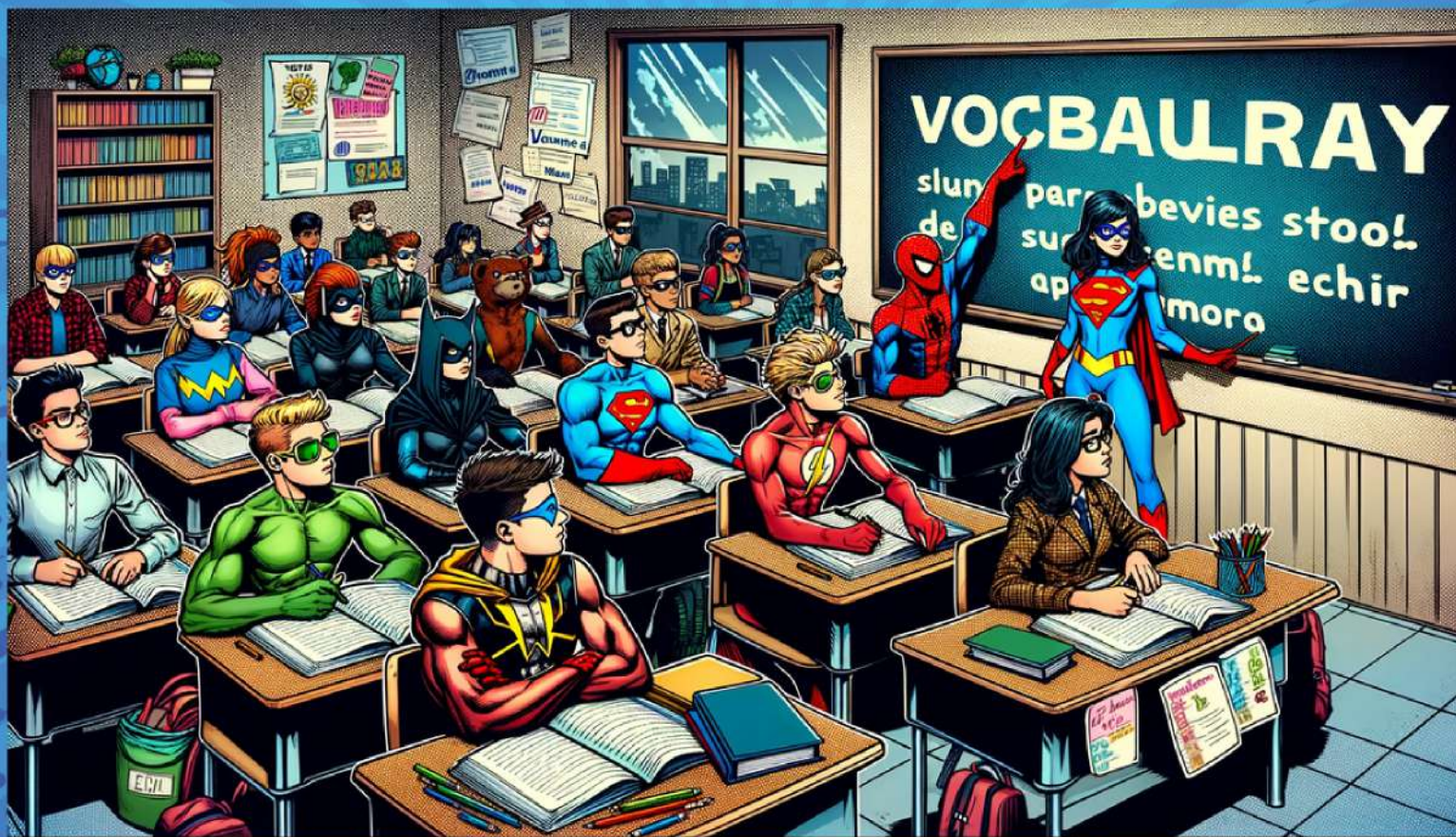

beast: an animal, especially a large or dangerous one, often used for fictional creatures (noun)

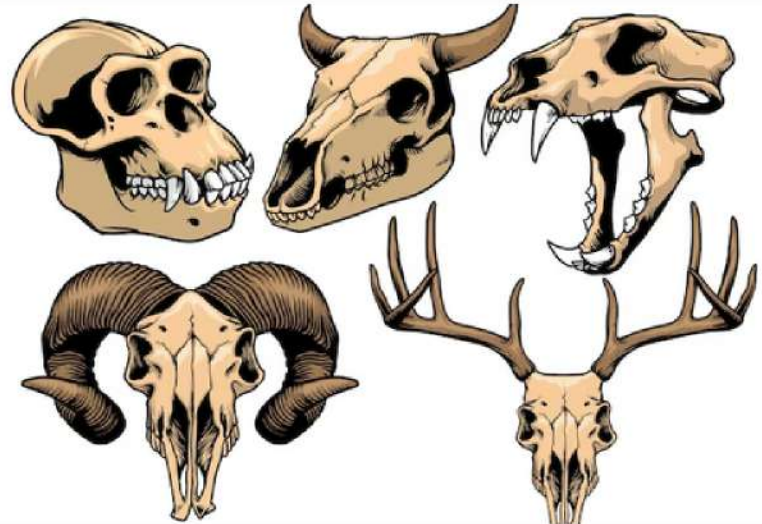


In the story, the hero fought the **beast** to protect the people.

Dinosaur - Vocabulary

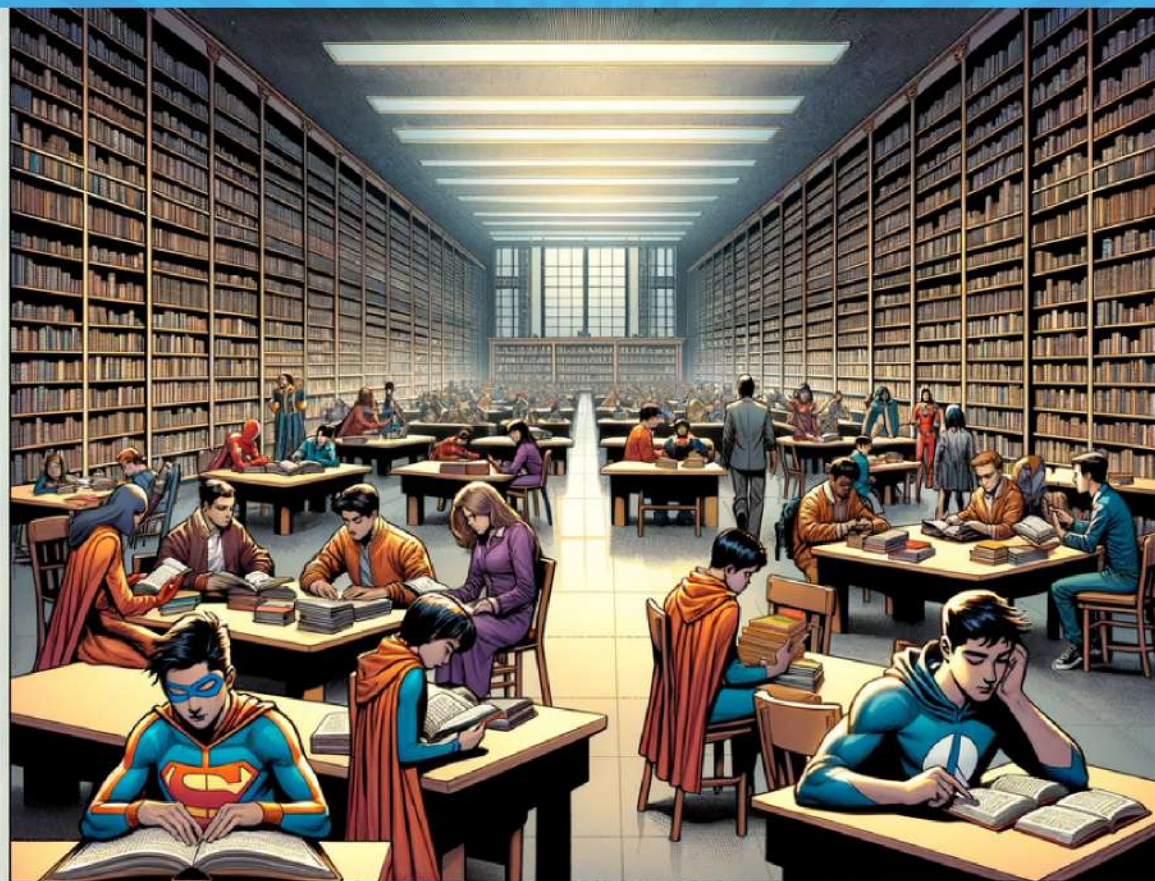


skull: the bones of the head that surround the brain and give the head its shape (noun)

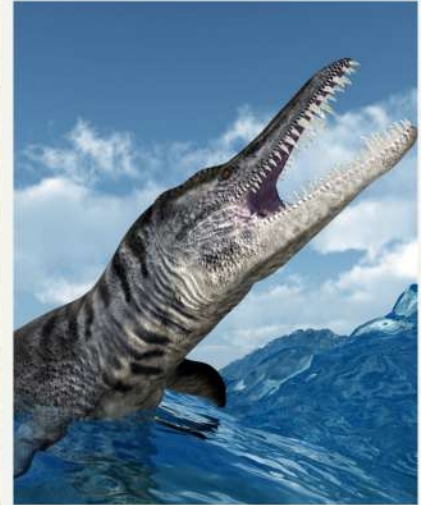
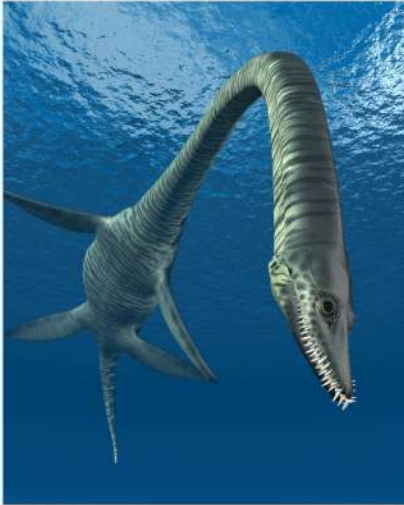

Diving into the Depths: The Aquatic Dinosaurs!



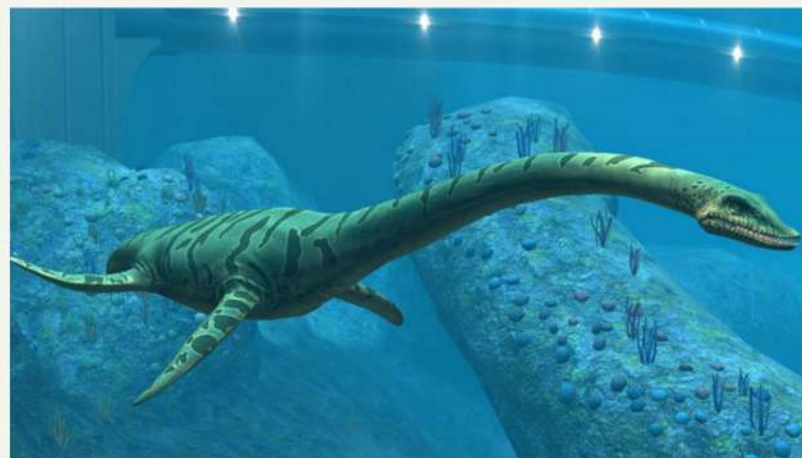

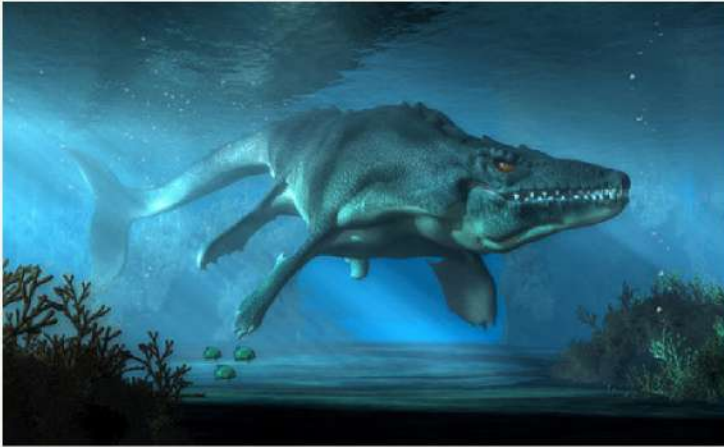
The Long-Necked Swimmer

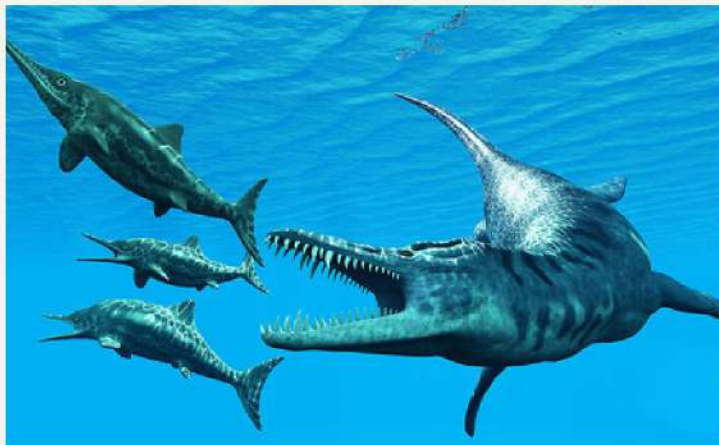
The Fish-Lizard

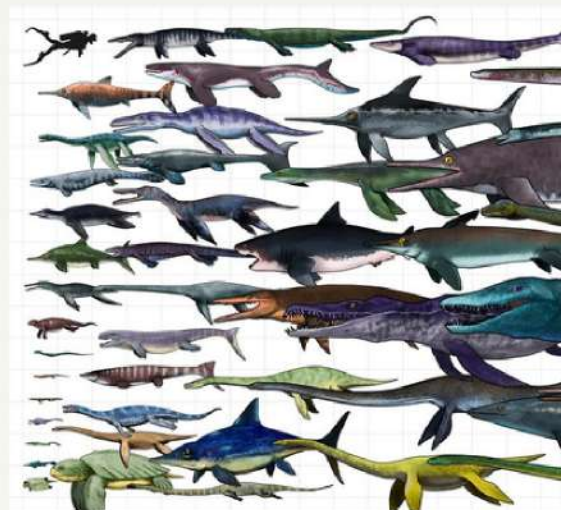


The Marine Hunter

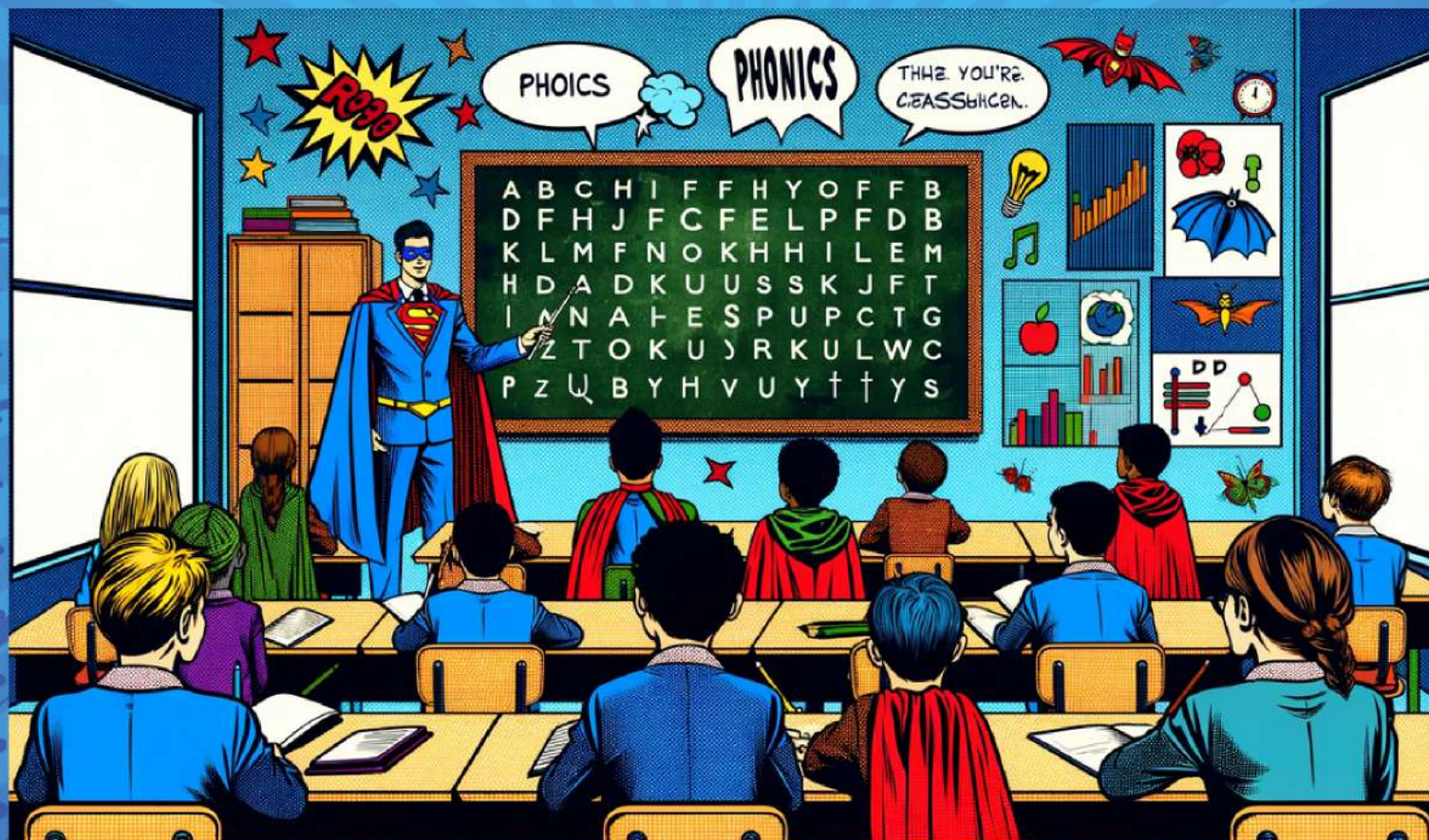
