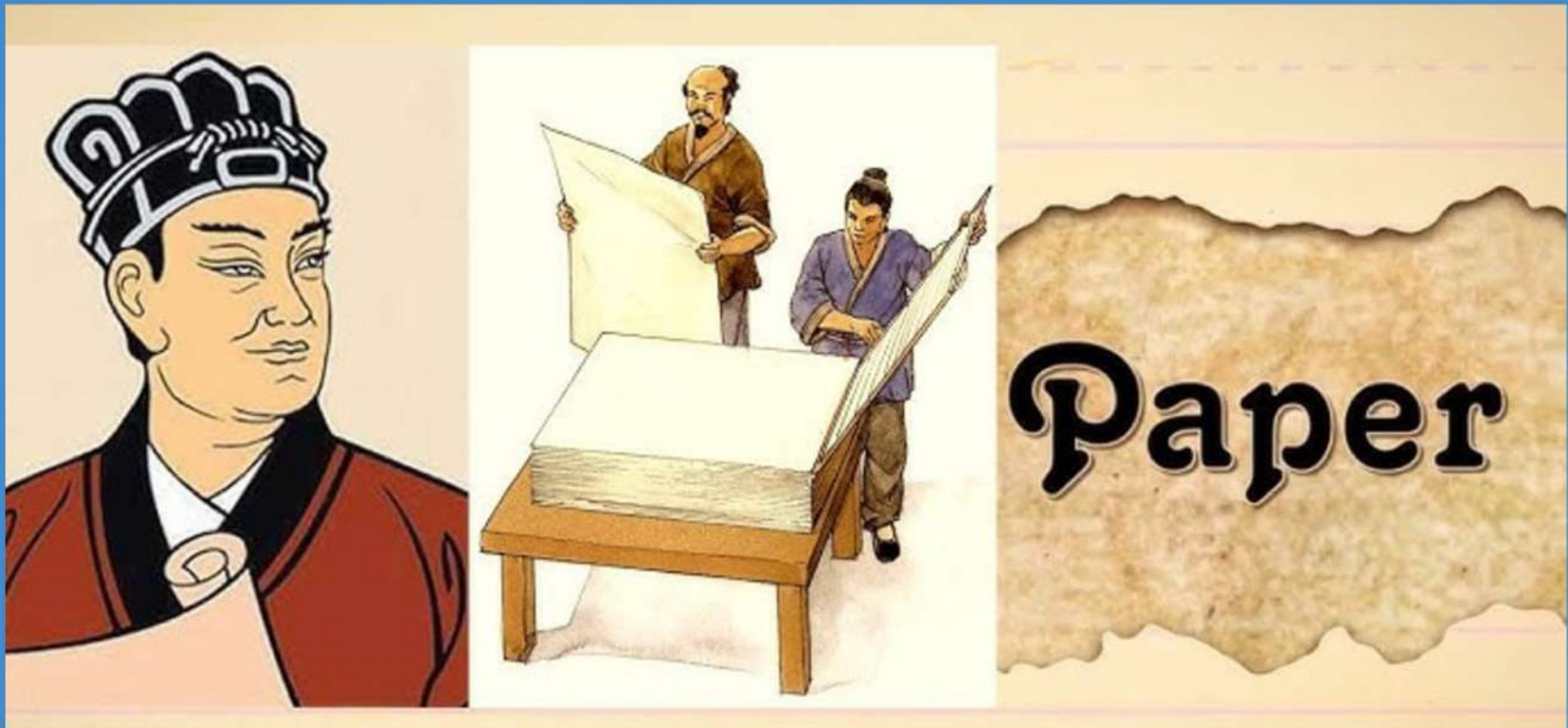
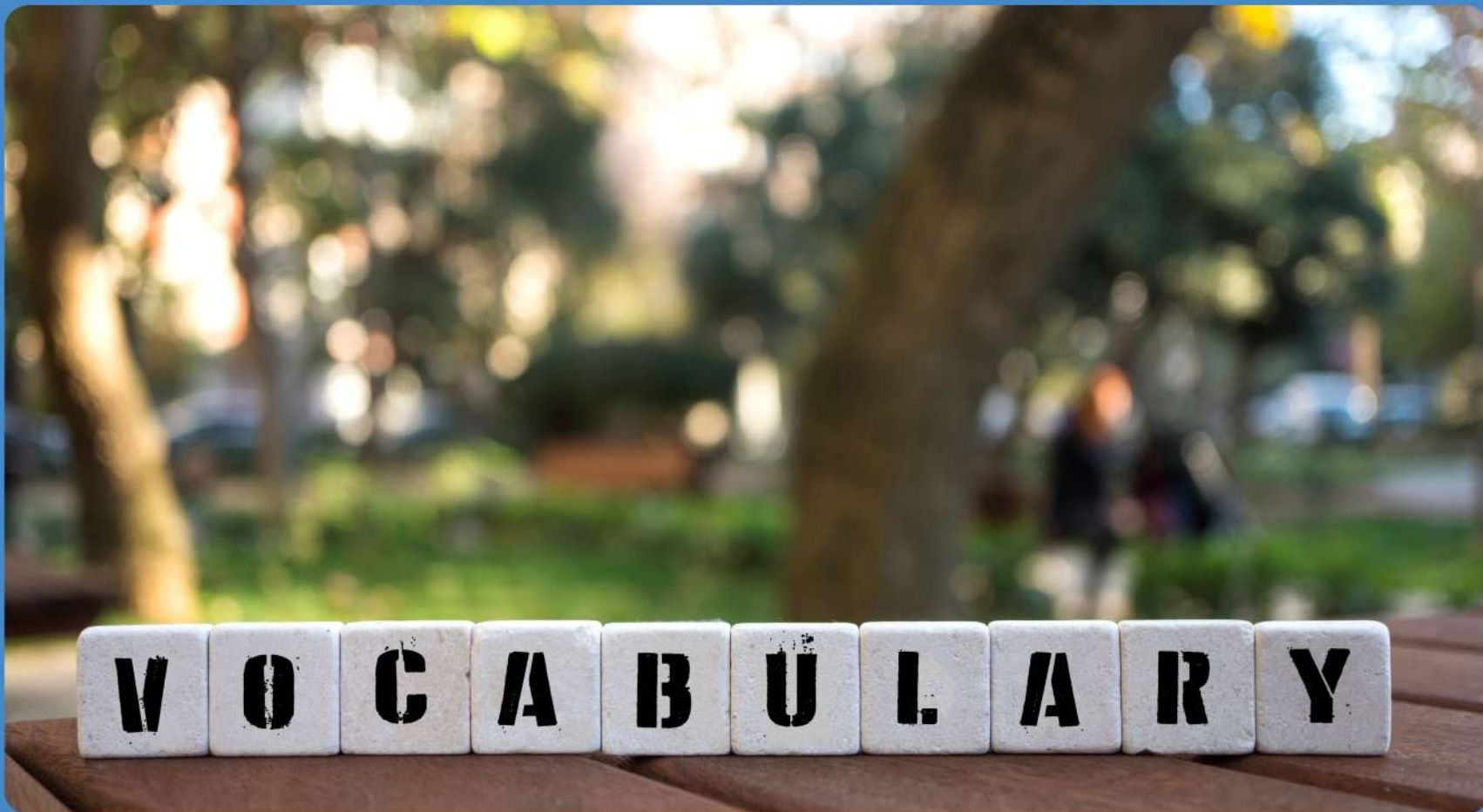

Paper - Vocabulary



pulp: a soft, wet mass, often produced by crushing something (noun)



They made a **pulp** by adding water to tiny pieces of wood and pounding it.

Paper - Vocabulary



fiber: very small pieces from something such as wood, cotton, or hemp (noun)

They use hemp **fibers** to make fabric.

manufacture: make a lot of something using machines (verb)



They **manufacture** cars in this building.

Working in a steel **mill** is a very difficult job.

The Invention of Paper

Ever wonder how people wrote before paper? It wasn't easy! They used bones, bamboo, or animal skins, which were heavy and hard to move. Imagine carrying that around! In 105 AD, a Chinese man named Cai Lun noticed a wasp building its nest with paper pulp. He thought, "What if I could make something like that for writing?" His idea changed history, making reading, writing, and sharing stories much easier for everyone around the world.
