


universal: (n) existing everywhere or involving everyone or everything






I wish all charging cables were **universal** so I didn't have to own so many.

practical: (adj) intended for actual use, useful; (of an idea, plan, or method) likely to succeed






A device should have a **practical** design, making it easy for users to work with.
