

Mysteries - Vocabulary

decipher: (v) to discover the meaning of something written badly or in a difficult or hidden way

Mysteries - Vocabulary

intrigued: (adj) very interested by something, especially something strange, unusual, or mysterious



People are often **intrigued** by ancient artifacts.

Mysteries - Vocabulary

speculate: (v) to think about something and make guesses about it



Without solid evidence, we can only **speculate** about what happened.

enigma: (n) a person or thing that is mysterious, puzzling, or difficult to understand




The ancient ruins present an **enigma** that archaeologists have yet to solve.


A Book Full of Questions
