

VOCABULARY



Seasons - Vocabulary

temperature: how hot or cold something is, measured in degrees (noun)



The **temperature** is 42 degrees Celsius on this hot summer day.

Seasons - Vocabulary

heat: a condition of being hot; hotness (noun)



The **heat** from the fire kept her hands warm.

Seasons - Vocabulary

shade: a darker area caused by something blocking the sun's light (noun)



The lion tried to lie in the **shade** to stay cool.

Seasons - Vocabulary

cool off: to become cool or cooler (phrasal verb)



The woman poured water on her face to **cool off** from the sun's heat.




Voiced and Unvoiced 'TH'
